Description

Icterine dye is formulated for precise control over tissue coloration. Compatible with all injection chemicals, Icterine's four shades may be added to the arterial solution to simulate any complexion tint and ethnic skin tone with remarkable faithfulness. Regular is best for infants and light complexions. Tan is well suited to African-American, Hispanics, Native Americans, and other complexions with brown tones. Peach is useful for elderly cases, yellowish skin tones, and Asian complexions. Suntan has more pink in the undertones than Tan for suntanned Caucasian skin. The shades may be mixed to produce a wide range of color values.

Features

Icterine's wetting agents promote uniform saturation of the tissues, lessening the risk of spotting. The resulting deeply-seated, delicate glow resembles living tissue more closely than when ordinary dyes are used. Non-dehydrating Icterine is more concentrated than other dyes, including Inr-Tone, so only about half as much will produce the desired color intensity.

Applications

General: The proper amount of Icterine to be used depends on the complexion and skin texture of each individual case. Generally speaking, average bodies still retaining some body heat and dead less than twelve hours usually require one-half to one full ounce of Icterine per half-gallon of solution. Do not add Icterine to pre-injection solutions. Of course, light complexions require less than medium or dark, and finer skin textures generally require less than coarser. If the lighting in the viewing room is too bright, causing a "washed out" look, a mixture of shades can compensate.

Hands: Like Inr-Tone, Icterine may also be used externally – particularly for treating the hands. Brush on one part of Icterine Peach diluted in six to eight parts of water.

Jaundice: For best results, the first and second half gallons of solution should consist only of 8 ounces each (at least) of Metaflow and Rectifiant, and enough tepid water to make a half gallon (no Icterine or arterial chemical). This pre-injection should be followed with a half-gallon arterial solution of: ½-ounce Icterine: 4-6 ounces each of Metasyn, Metaflow, and Rectifiant; and enough tepid water to make a half gallon. Repeat injections of this arterial formula until the jaundice discolorations disappear or are camouflaged. A minimum of 3 half-gallon injections is usually required. As much as one full ounce of Icterine per half-gallon solution may be needed to overcome intense jaundice conditions. Should the body receive sufficient color before adequate preservation is achieved, omit Icterine from subsequent injections.
